Hawaii has new standards in early education so more children are prepared for kindergarten and are on track to read at grade level by the third grade. From kindergarten through twelfth grade, students are being taught to think critically and apply their knowledge to real world situations with the Hawaii Common Core standards. And, college students are encouraged to earn 15 credits per semester so they are able to graduate on time.

Hawaii's education leaders have set a goal to have 55% of working age adults in Hawaii hold a 2- or 4-year college degree by the year 2025. As a state, we must increase the number of Hawaii adults with college degrees and certificates to meet workforce demands.
